- What he claims will happen is almost inevitable, because the reproductions are not only enormously beautiful but also amazingly accurate.
- This is an excellent way to decorate one's home or office with high-quality works of art without having to spend a fortune.
- It will cost you a tiny fraction of the price of the original or an illegal forgery and the deal is entirely legal. Legality is guaranteed by the statement: "This is an authentic fake", written in ink on the back of each canvas.
- Many had spent time in prison because of their work and were happy to work legally without the threat of arrest. Moreover, they could enjoy an assured income.
- "Then, I realised that millions of people would be delighted to own beautifully painted forgeries, provided they were legal and reasonably priced." Price and quality are the keys to his success as a master forger.
- Besides Agnelli, Frank Sinatra and Sophia Loren have bought 12 and 3 fakes respectively, and other big names are waiting in line for "real fake" masterpieces.
- The Museo Immaginario moves first to Madrid and then on to London in March. All the museum's clients are invited to the grand openings, which will be quite elegant e
- H By 1984 he had created a group of first class painters, and opened Museo Immaginario, a gallery for legal fakes, in Cremona. He began to sell paintings which were made by masters in the art of copying.
- The artists sign the painting with a pseudonym which the museum insists on in order to protect the artists from the interference of the public.

London Museums

A. Museum of London

This fascinating museum illustrates the history of London from prehistoric times to the present day. Included is the second World War gallery, which tells the story of Londoners' bravery during the Blitz. A special feature until 16 October is an exhibition called Carry on Collecting! This is a display of items that Londoners collect, a part of the People's Show, a national celebration of Britons' collections put together by forty-eight museums in the United Kingdom.

C. Victoria and Albert Museum

This famous museum has some magnificent collections, including the recently opened permanent exhibition, the Glass Gallery, featuring one of the world's finest collections of glass from all ages and from all over the world. A special feature until 11 September is Pugin: a Gothic Passion, which gives you a chance to see examples of the designer Pugin's furniture, textities, wallpapers, silver and jewellery, a fascinating glimpse into the era of Gothic-style interiors.

D. British Museum and British Library

One of the greatest and most varied museums in the world. Don't plan to see it all in one day - there's just too much of interest. Don't miss the new Roman City and Empire gallery, with its fascinating glimpses into one of history's most powerful civilisations. A special feature until 18 September is Beauty and the Banknote: Images of Women on Paper Money. Women have adorned paper money for more than 200 years, and the exhibition examines these women and their place in society.
