	(Religious leaders were influental in early colonies/settlements/communities and their sermons and intercommunication are some of the most organized records of early American writing available.)								
	Political writings such as the Federalist Papers and the AntiFederalist Papers were written by the "Founding Fathers" including the most famous, although they were published as essays and anonymously at the time. (Feds - James Madison, Alexander Hamilton, Antifeds - Jefferson)								
	Autobiography of Benjamin Franklin - combines the political with the idealized, "rags to riches" story (mostly fictionalized)

naturalism in America

Naturalism is a literary movement, it started in the late 19th century, in Europe and the United States.

-It is an extension of realism, with interest in portraying life accurately and objectively.

Naturalist literature was often into dark human nature and depressing subject, including poverty, violence.

It often portrayed characters in desperate situations, strugling with the harsh realities of life.

Naturalism in American literature reflected broader societal problems of the time, including the impact of industrialization, urbanization.

The term

was coined by **Gertrude Stein** to categorise a group of American writers who **moved** to, and lived in, **Paris** during the that time.

Characteristics

The generation was "lost" in the sense that its <u>inherited</u> values were no longer relevant in the postwar world "disoriented, wandering, directionless" spirit of many of the war's survivors in the early <u>postwar period</u>


